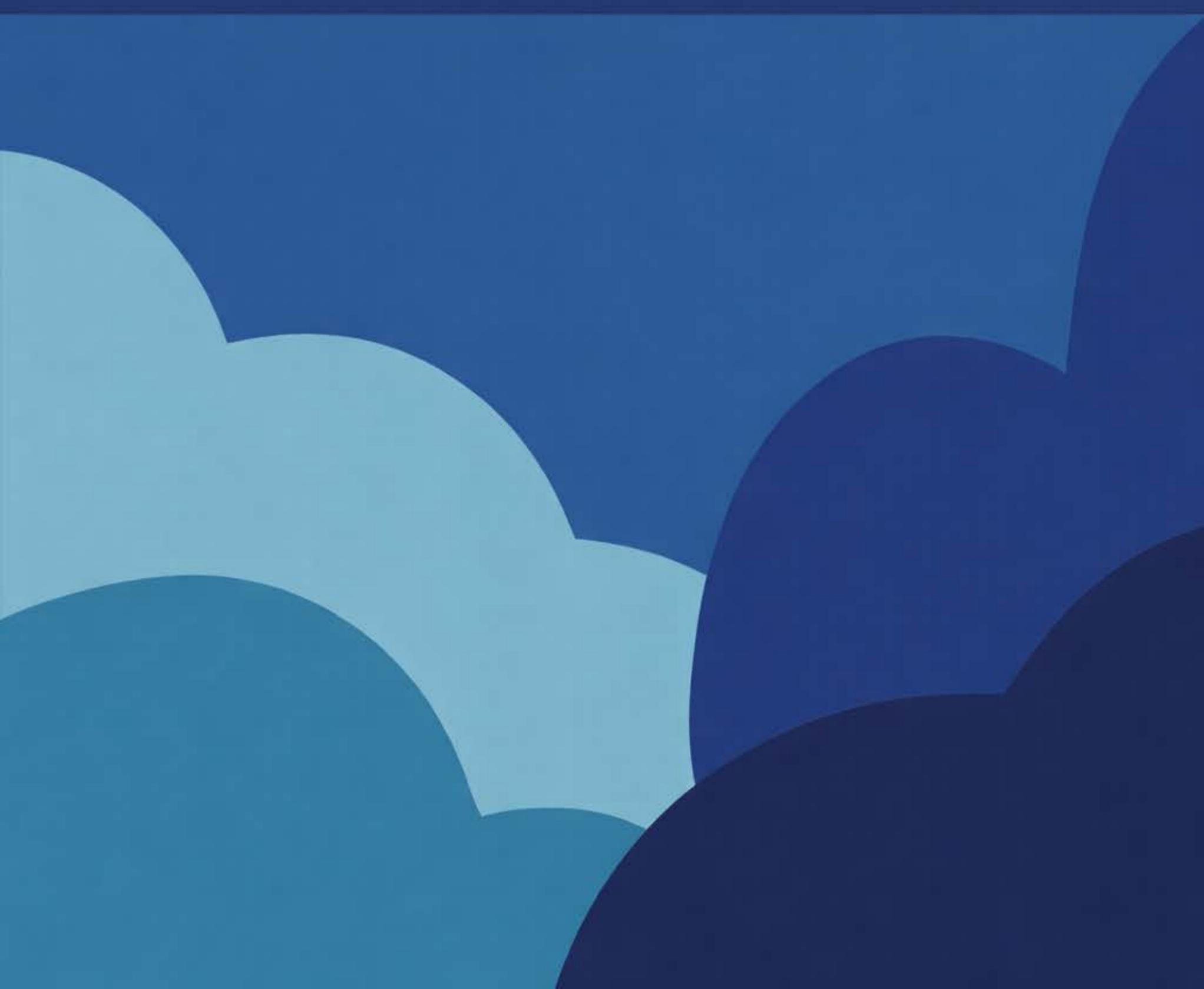


Course Design in Articulate Rise 360



Articulate Rise 360 – Course Design Portfolio Snapshot

Course Overview

- Modality: Asynchronous core content with synchronous Zoom sessions
- Platform: Articulate Rise 360

Instructional Design Approach

Sample Learning Flow

1. Orientation and expectations
2. Context building (author background and cultural framework)
3. Guided reading of an authentic text
4. Collaborative analysis and discussion
5. Creative application through writing
6. Individual performance task with guided feedback
7. Reflection and synthesis
